Motion: That the ARC Model United Nations team is requesting thirteen thousand and four hundred seventy-six dollars (\$13,476.00) to attend the 74rd Annual Model United Nations of the Far West conference in April to represent American River College at this national conference in San Francisco.

This will allow students to take the topics in which they learn at conference and apply them onto advocating on campus through accessibility, indigenous rights, and financial troubles for students. Additionally, the research will be shared with students during the next ASB Club Day after the conference to bring awareness to issues around the world and relate them to issues on campus. Furthermore, the information discovered through research will be brought to the Associated Student Body of American River College Student Senate (ASBARCSS) and use the data to help foster connections with populations at American River College.

Additional Information:

The ARC Model United Nations organization has been nationally recognized for its excellence in diplomacy and delegate participation. Each year, students prepare for the Model United Nations competition by preparing resolutions, policy statements, and speeches, to be presented at the conference itself. Model United Nations is the sole representative of ARC at this conference and is one of the few community colleges to be recognized with prestigious awards in recognition of demonstrated excellence in diplomacy.

Students actively fundraise throughout the year via Clubs Day participation, garnered incentive points, and external fundraisers/sponsors. Typically, uncovered costs are the burden of the student delegation. The students of ARC's Model United Nations urges that this motion is looked upon favorably. thirteen thousand and four hundred seventy-six dollars (\$13,476.00) would be allocated to cover all costs associated with residency.

If the money is given to the organization, they plan to allocate the thirteen thousand and six hundred thirty-six dollars (\$13,636.00) to cover a five (5) day, four (4) night stay at the Hyatt Hotel in Burlingame (sixteen (16) student delegates and one (1) advisor, two (2) students per room for a total of nine (9) rooms and one(1) advisor room at one hundred and eighty dollars and forty-five cents per night for a total of seven thousand four hundred and forty-two dollars (\$7,442.00).

Student delegate fees to participate in the five (5) day conference and simulation for sixteen (16) students are one hundred dollars (\$110) per student. One thousand six hundred dollars (\$1,760) will be allocated for delegate fees. College participation fee to reserve countries is two hundred fifty dollars (\$325.00)

Food expenses for sixteen (16) student delegates and one (1) faculty advisor, breakfast (ten dollars (\$10) per day) five hundred and ten dollars (\$510), lunch (fifteen dollars (\$15) per day) one thousand and twenty dollars (\$1,020) and dinner (thirty-one dollars (\$31) per day, Monday night excluded due to conference banquet covered in delegate fee) one thousand five hundred and eighty-one dollars (\$1,581) for a grand total of three thousand one hundred and eleven dollars (\$3,111)

Travel by six (6) cars, faculty and student cars, gas six hundred theory-eight dollars (\$638) and parking at the conference fifteen (\$15) per day for a total of three hundred and sixty dollars (\$360).

The funding is for five-day access to the conference. At the conference, the organization will have delegates present at each simulation of United Nations General Assembly and respective committees. The conference will be held in Burlingame, California from April 11 – April 15, 2024, Human Security: Our Shared Responsibilities in the 21st Century.

In preparation for the conference and participation at the conference the Model United Nations Club meets the following Student Learning Outcomes, ARC Institutional SLOs and ARC Strategic Goals:
