Action Items

8. AI Charter Student Success Council (2nd read)

John Burke: third line “VAR” has been changed to “Gemini” and should be copy edited as such

Adam Karp: what does the SSC need in order to move forward? This charter reads like a “project team,” but he doesn’t have a clear sense of what the SCC needs (timeliness is important). Suggested that the timeline be shortened in order to be more efficient.

Alisa Shubb: clarified the difference between “resource panels” (informs councils to move forward with their work), this resource panel seems to be a general support to all interested constituency groups (beyond the SCC).

Ricardo Caton: If the group will not provide policy suggestions, what is the purpose?

Alisa Shubb: Policy is not an issue here; information is the goal (via a Literature Review). The objective seems to be to create a one-stop source for information.

Tak Auyeung: A lot of people on campus are holding a little part of AI use/ethics. This charter attempts to combine those fragments into a coherent body.

Veronica Lopez (acting president): The conversations about AI have been very different across all four Los Rios campuses (specifically the ethics and environmental impacts are especially strong at ARC).

Sarah Lehmann: Other than the Folsom Lake summit, were there any discussions about the ethics of AI? Discouraged the assumption that ARC is the only campus considering environmental impact and ethics; embrace whatever conversations about AI emerge

Dyanne Marte: from the CT and Arts perspective, there was a strong emphasis in the Folsom Lake summit around English and Language Arts

Ricardo: Clarified that the District should not be the ones making the policy. Emphasized the need for faculty to be involved in the policy process.

Alisa: there is no movement at the District level to make any policy on AI. District Educational TEchnology (which is not Senate controlled), there are decisions being made about using AI in Canvas or integrating AI tools like Kahnmigo.

Dyanne Marte: How many people have been working with AI? Roughly 10 hands raised in the room. Urged faculty to receive training/PD on AI immediately.

9. Board Regulations (1st read)

a. R - 7421 WEE

Vivian Dillon: Clarified the “may” and the “shall” changes made to the Regulations (7421 - WEE)

Alisa Shubb: Urged senators to share these changes out with the constituencies to get feedback and suggestions and reactions

b. R - 1751 International Education

Alisa Shubb: clarified it had “been a minute” since this reg was edited. This change came out of District faculty committee. There has been faculty input in the form of the committee members, but the local Senates are being asked to weigh in.

David McCusker: urge to consider diversity and equity in the wording of these regulations and the places that are included as sites (pointed to the current strong emphasis on Western European countries).

Sarah Lehmann: Clarified: were these regulations about separating the District-led programs from the individual department-led programs?

Shannon Pries (online): Will they be hiring a new District Coordinator that is housed at the District Office rather than having the consortium stuff moving around to different colleges every couple of years?

Sarah Lehmann: thought the change concerned about the process through which new programs would be run. Asked for summary/walk through in this specific regulation.

Reports (5-10 minutes per item)

10. SSRC Information (Dr. Nicole Porter)

Diana Garcia (Dean of Student Support Services) in the room as a guest (Dr Nicole Porter sharing screen):

Fall 2024 transition. History of why the SSRC existed. Created to serve students in the EOP&S, NextUp, and CARE categorical programs and the unique needs these students have (later extended to serve all categorical programs).

1.0 Classified staff (100% EOP&S funded), which created questions about appropriateness of serving students/programs outside of that office; tutors funded through SEAP

Staff reduction (2 student help tutors, 2 temp classified) in the SSRC

Focused on two subject areas: Math and Science only

Student use: 91 unduplicated students (60 EOP&S, 41 DSPS, 13 CalWORKS, 7 TRIO SSS) served in Fall 2023, 106 unduplicated students served in Spring 2024.

A majority of students used the SSRC for less than 4 hours of time in Fall 2023

“Communication shared with student support programs team”

Connected with the LRC to discuss “best practices” from the SSRC

Judith Valdez (EOP&S Counselor): The SSRC was asked to move to a smaller space to

share with the Career Center, where tutors were not able to perform their duties and non-SSRC students were coming to receive students. Questioned how accurate the hours and attendance were, given the space considerations from the semesters that were included. Expressed frustration with the lack of communication with staff and faculty in the categorical programs who “work directly with students who have unique needs.” Emphasized the high degree of training that their tutors received. Stated there was not a plan presented for the transition to accommodate students with disabilities. Emails were not responded to by administrators.

Sarah Lehmann: Many students came in September to make public comment at an Academic Senate meeting who were surprised by the “transition.” Expressed surprise and disappointment (after our College and District’s failures) at the continued lack of collegial consultation. Encouraged administrators to apologize when they realize that they were not inclusive of faculty/staff in making institutional decisions that impact them.

Nicole: apologized about the transition’s failure. Cited a number of transitions happening (Davies Hall and “new people coming in”). Admin made the assumption that the communication happened prior to them starting. Acknowledged the lack of communication and apologized directly to Judith and the students who were impacted. Nobody talked about the LRC and the Library sitting under Student Services during the reorganization process. Stated she will “Take one for the team.”

Mayra Mireles-Tijero: Supported Judith’s comment about one year of data not being sufficient in assessing an office’s use. Emphasized the challenge to get students connected with services and the impact that physical distance of a service in shaping student access.

Connie Ayala (EOP&S Coordinator): clarified a slide stating that there was a collaboration of best practices with the EOPS Coordinator; she noted that the slide was incorrect because she did not participate in any plan or discussion with administration and doesn’t believe there was a plan. Emphasized that she was not included or invited to collaborate in a plan and stated that there continued to be a lack of transparency and communication from the administration. She did not know about the transition until receiving an email after the decision had been made. She was not asked for input or given the chance to share her experience and knowledge from being the last Basic Skills Coordinator at ARC who provided the initial seed money for what became the SSRC and was the last LRC Coordinator for 7 years who coordinated general tutoring in the LRC. She believes a lack of respect for faculty is at the core of the lack of communication.

Ricardo Caton: Appreciates the apology (admits it is rare). Expressed concern about the transition of the VPSSE’s potential to lose sight of the “we’ll do better” effort.

Diana Garcia: absolutely appreciates the viewpoints that have been shared. Wants to create opportunities for conversations with counseling and support staff. Commits to sitting down with folks (starting with categorical counselors and classified staff) to look at how we connect students to services (tutoring specifically). Need to build a better understanding of who the tutors are how they receive professional development.

11. Faculty Hiring Research (Dr. Brenda Valles and Dr. Diana Lopez)

Preliminary findings from a project in response to a Senate resolution passed in October to review the Spring 2024 FT faculty hiring process, policies, and practices

High points (report submitted as supplemental material):

Data on hiring is highly confidential and RO does not maintain HR data

Obtained existing data from multiple secondary sources (some inconsistencies in data)

12 filled, 10 not filled (6 failed in the second round), 3 were cancelled prior to second round, 1 was postponed); 18 positions made to second round, 15 offers extended (12 accepted)

Successful searches had larger applicant pools

ARC is an outlier in terms of failure rate (and volume); 2023-2024 was the only year with any failures across the district; appears to be a strain on College and District resources because we were all hiring in large numbers (often overlapping)

Data suggests the need to reduce the timeline/timing

Sabina Simon: as a new hire, communication is really in need to improvement. There were 4-5 weeks between 2nd level interview and offer. Then there were 2 months between the offer and communication from District/HR.

Tak Auyeung:

12. Curriculum Handbook Update (Aaron Bradford)

The entirety of the Curriculum Handbook has been updated/revised (attached a PDF in the Zoom chat)

Retitled the handbook title (including branding)

Made the flow more reader-friendly (with links in table of contents)

The document will be treated as a “living document” because of the fast rate of change

in CA community colleges (and how quickly things can become “out of date” in terms of policy changes like common course numbering)

Handbook includes resources such as videos

13. Pride & Supporting our DI Students (Sara Smith)

Sara Smith introduced themselves, joined by Liz Geiser (Pride Center coordinator) ARC needs to have more conversations about supporting queer and trans students at all levels. We are in a “crisis moment” right now when it comes to the rights of queer/trans students. No formal acknowledgement about the unique impact of the 2024 election on our queer/trans students. Cites the number of state-level legislation (500+ bills/proposals) that target queer/trans communities. 84 anti-trans/queer bills currently sit at the federal level (currently stalled, but likely to gain momentum in the coming months). Discussion of the many contexts and institutional experiences that our students encounter (family context emphasized). Goal: start a conversation about what we can/will do to “do better by our trans/queer students.” Starts with demonstrating that we care. Need to hear this from our administrators and that they recognize that what is happening is negatively impacting our queer/trans students. How are we hiring (faculty, administrators, staff)? We need people who are equity-minded and who are clearly thinking about and acting on the needs of queer/trans students. The lack of a Pride Learning Community Coordinator pointed out. There has been a lack of outreach across the District to hire a new coordinator (two failed searches in back-to-back semesters); need to augment the outreach beyond FT faculty at ARC. Fear that the Pride Learning Community will fold or suffer in the absence of resourcing and intentional outreach to fill it.

Liz Geiser: in the Pride Center full-time. What employees can do to support queer/trans students (there is an important intersectionality in this community): expressed her own availability to talk and train folks; passed around a sheet about “best practices” around gender identity; discussed faculty who have dead-named and misgendered students (and the harm it causes students; if you make a mistake, make it about students (or the folks who have been offended).

Michaela Cooper: the job description seems to be ridiculously more intense than a .4 reassign time.

David McCusker: Ask for clarification: did the job description pass through the Academic Senate? No record was found of it being vetted through this body. The Pride Learning Community coordinator position is the only position that explicitly mentions “intersectionality,” which creates an undue burden on the position.

Veronica Lopez: believes that the job description did come through the Senate. Spoke from the perspective of the Rising Scholars coordinator, where she has to navigate a reassign coordinator position that does not fully compensate for the time.

Alisa: recalls hearing from the Senate to “holistically recondister” the faculty coordinator positions in order to align learning community coordinators.

Sonya: The idea of a “menu” is not clear when folks read the coordinator job description (especially the “requirements” section).

Sara: when they drafted that job description (informed by other faculty coordinators at ARC and across the District), they drew it up as a 1.0 reassign time position. Felt directed by the lack of communication (was told it was going to be a .6 position before it was posted as a .4).

Jeff Sacha: clarified there were 39 “responsibilities” across 7 “types of work”

Ricardo: Pointed out the difference between an Academic Senate President having a conversation with an administrator and the Academic Senate (as a body) being consulted. Urged that the Academic Senate President not speak on behalf of the entire body without consultation or input.

Liz: Plugged a FLEX event (Zoom) “Safe Spaces” training.
